Item No. 4: Confirmation / Modification of the topics of the research work of MPhil and PhD scholars of the previous batches.

Item No. 5: List of M.Phil and PhD recipients.

The Board noted the matter.

Item No.6: BA/B.Com./B.Sc./MA (English) syllabus under CBCS 2016.

The Board discussed the matter at length and suggested that the Departments which offer papers should decide or choose the papers to be taught in semesters rather than the Departments offering the programme. Finally the Board approved the UG and PG syllabus with slight changes in MA (English) paper titles so as to be on par with the distance mode.

Item No. 7: Status of Admission of PhD candidates; 2010 and 2012 batches.

As the extension period of the candidates of 2010 ended and the candidates namely Mr. Anand kattimani (1001040107) and Mr. Azeem Pasha (1001040109) did not submit their research works, the Board discussed the matter at length and resolved that if the candidates seek further extension, they should be asked to submit their work which would be assessed by the DRC, and accordingly it would forward its recommendation to the Vice Chancellor.

Since Mr. Khateebuddeen (1201040101) of 2012 batch did not contact his supervisor for the past three years and did not pay the semester fees, the Board resolved to cancel his admission.

Item No. 13: Admission Criteria.

It has been resolved after discussion that the preference criteria and Reservation Policy which has been in practice by the Department till 2015 be reverted. Preferences:

- c) English studied as language in qualifying degree programme + knowledge of Urdu
- d) English Literature / Honours.
- e) English as optional
- f) General English

Candidates should have studied Urdu as a subject or medium of instruction at X, XII, UG or PG level. Students if admitted without knowledge of Urdu, will have to study and pass a compulsory paper in Urdu.
